

## New & increased United Way investments reflect Urban Exchange responses

In the first Urban Exchange survey, Winnipeggers weighed in on social issues and quality of life in our city (see sidebar, "Survey 1 Results").

In our second survey, we're following up on your top concerns by asking **how you'd allocate \$1000** among the issues Winnipeggers identified as most important. So far, respondents have directed an average of \$298 toward addressing poverty, more than any other issue.

Poverty is closely related to many other social issues. That's why United Way is working hard to invest in programs and strategies that promote financial independence and ensure our children and youth have the opportunity to succeed and become engaged and productive adults.

## In the last year, United Way:

- In partnership with SEED, continued to mobilize the Winnipeg AssetBuilders Partnership, a network of nine agency partners delivering asset-building programs in many neighbourhoods in our city.
- Approved a new \$150 000 investment over the next three years for Opportunities for Employment, a non profit organization that helps ex-offender youth (ages 18-29) build job search skills and find meaningful employment.
- Increased investment in Graffiti Art Programming, Inc. (GAP), a non-profit community youth art centre in Winnipeg's core area that promotes the use of art as a tool for community development, social change, and individual growth.

## Survey 1 Results As reported in 2008



**49%** of 2893 participants included **youth crime & gang activity** as one of their top three social issues

**39%** were concerned about **crime** in general

**28%** identified **poverty** as a critical issue.

Since early 2008, more than 1100 new participants have completed the survey, and the top three issues have remained the same!



**83%** of respondents agree that: "the community as a whole is responsible for finding opportunities to reduce poverty."

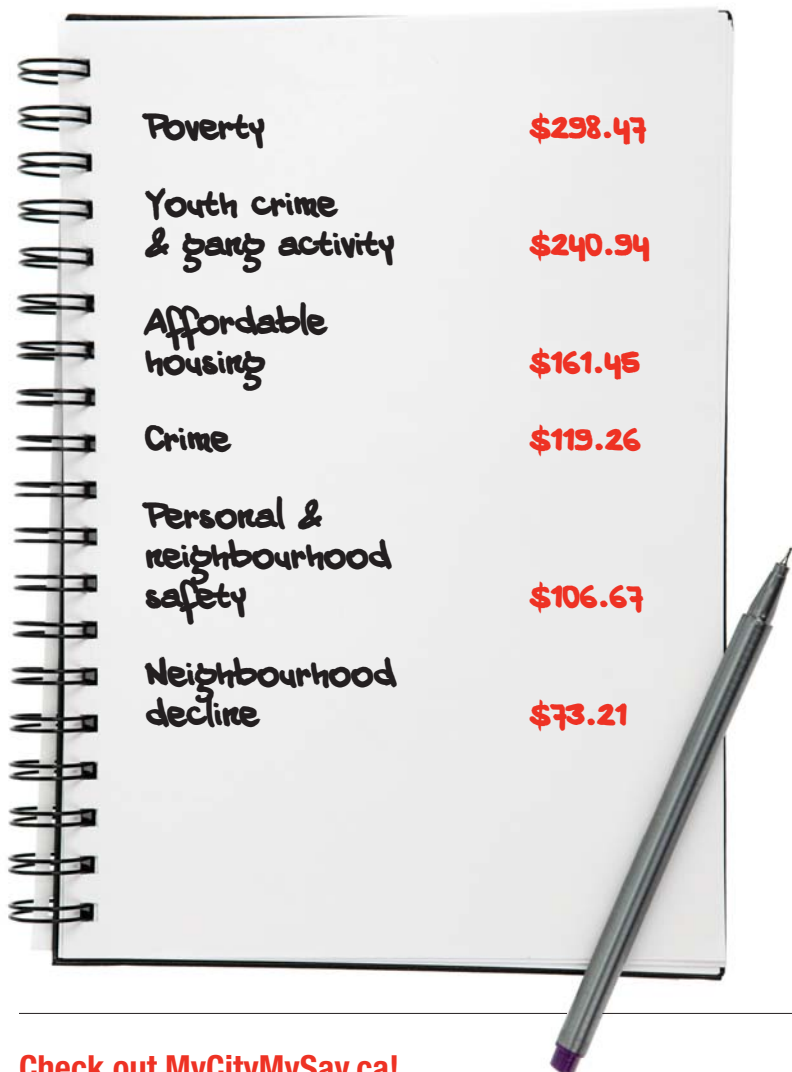
**63%** agree that: "individuals living in poverty are responsible to take steps to address their own situation."

★ In 2009, the province will make an additional \$800,000 annual investment in financial education and asset-building. The Manitoba Saves initiative will mean up to 700 Manitobans living in low-income situations will be able to enroll in money management training. The initiative will also offer matched savings incentives to up to 450 Manitobans who save for housing, education or starting a small business.

In our first survey, respondents **identified the social issues** they were most concerned about. **In Survey 2, we took the top six and asked how you'd allocate \$1000** to help address these issues.

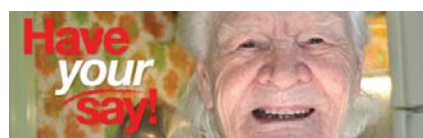

**98%** agree or strongly agree that **“the ideal city is one where people of different races and cultures and people with different lifestyles and backgrounds live and work together.”**

### In your words

**“Generally people treat others the way they themselves are treated or have been treated.”**

**“I am definitely trying to think more about **what my responsibilities are as a community member**, and I think that the culture of community that many immigrants bring with them is extremely important and ought to be adopted by our own society. We ought to create greater **links among neighbours** and reach out to those around us.”**

**“We need more opportunities to **connect** with each other in communities - to come together around **common goals**.”**
